Charter School Facts:

- Public schools including charters cannot charge tuition
- Charters are bound by collective bargaining
- Charters are subject to NCLB and all State testing requirements
- Charters operate like a small business
- Charters must abide by state "health and safety standards"
- Principals are accountable for SPED/IDEA compliance yet have no authority over the distribution of resources
- Charter School Review Panel mandated to issue charters by the Attorney General, despite funding



GOALS

- Clarify the distribution of funding for K-12 education in Hawaii
- Identify any areas of inequity
- Develop solutions to ensure equity to all public school students
- Collaborate with the DOE to increase funding for all public schools in Hawaii







Adding Non General Funds Identified







DOE & Charter Funding Comparison – FY 2009-10






Summary of Fact Finding Effort

- Equity was not achieved with \$547 million in Federal & EDN150 funding. Access to services & grant notification inconsistencies were identified.
- A \$332 per pupil difference existed between the DOE and PCS.
- Charters need access to Impact Fees.
- Charters had no mechanism to access \$225 million in facilities financing (CIP).

Recommendations

- Create a reliable system to allow Charters access to federal competitive grant opportunities.
- Ensure that services provided in lieu of funding are equitable.
- Move Non-SPED funding within EDN150 to EDN100.
- Establish Charters as an LEA to access federal funding.
- Give Charters a proportionate share of facilities funding.
- Create a mechanism for post school opening funding adjustments.
- Educate Legislators and B&F on how the funding formula functions in relation to the budget appropriation.
- Collaborate with the DOE in advocating for adequate per pupil funding.
